Many New Initiatives Under Way With Help of Active Members

We are halfway through the calendar year, rushing into the 2nd Annual Joint Conference of the Texas Rural Development Council and the

Texas Rural Health Association. Last fall's conference was a success and we are hoping that this year's gathering will be able to address a number of issues identified in Kerrville. We expect to see you September 17-19 in Lubbock!

Your association has been working on a number of initiatives this year and I will list a few that impact health care for rural citizens.

- TRHA is participating on the TrailBlazer Health Enterprises, LLC, Intermediary Advisory Committee reviewing local medi-

cal policy drafts for Medicare Part A services prior to finalization of policies for providing healthcare services to rural residents.

- A TRHA board member serves on the rural healthcare work group at the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid services (CMS) Region VI advisory meetings.

- The association was asked to nominate rural providers to serve on the Texas Department of Health's Radiological Advisory Committee.

- TRHA recently conducted a meeting of the medical schools, public health education institutions, and associations serving rural health issues so that we can build a better understanding of the special needs of rural communities.

- Our support was solicited by the Texas Department of Health on a project for TB patients in East Texas.

- The Colorado Rural Health Center (state office of rural health)

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has asked for our technical assistance in the continuing formation of their state rural health association.

- Our board members have taken an active role in either participating or attending the public hearings and executive board meetings of the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA) as we continue to develop a supportive relationship with this new agency.

- TRHA board members have represented Texas at the National Rural Health Association (NRHA) Policy Institute in March and the NRHA Skills Building Workshop in July, both in Washington DC, and also at its 25th Annual Conference in May in Kansas City.

- A TRHA board member serves on NRHA's conference planning committee for its 2003 conference in Salt Lake City.

At the beginning of my term, I asked for association members to get involved. You need to work and be ever vigilant to make sure that we who live in the rural areas



of the state are voicing our concerns, not only for ourselves, but for communities that do not have access to the rule makers. We all need to talk to the decision makers who impact the healthcare we receive. You have done a great job! You have to communicate with the legislators and regulators, but you also have to talk to your healthcare providers to see what they need to keep healthcare services in their communities.

This summer is coming to a

close and medical student rural rotations are ending. Did you have an aspiring student doctor, student physician assistant, or student advanced nurse practitioner training in your community this year? You need to "grow your own" as they say, and what better way to have healthcare providers come to the country to practice medicine than to show them early the benefits of rural

living. Next year, check with your community doctors and hospitals to see if they are getting these students in for rural training and get involved to make them feel welcome and wanted. Who knows, someday that student just might be your family's health care provider.



Bob Turner named TRHA C&D Consultant

Creative partnering has helped TRHA achieve solid solutions to rural problems in the past. The latest example is the selection of retiring State Representative Bob Turner as TRHA's Director of Communications and Development, effective July 1. Rep. Turner's rural background, his 11 years in the Texas House, and his involvement with the Rural Caucus will bring another knowledgeable perspective to the TRHA decision-making table.

"I am really excited about the opportunity to work from this side of the table for the Texas Rural Health Association, for a change, after having worked for them so long from the legislative perspective," Rep. Turner said.

Since 1991, when he was first elected, Rep. Turner has served the 73rd district in the Texas House, a rural district which includes 17 counties in West and Central Texas. He has been a leader in the House, chairing the

Committee on Public Safety and serving on the House Land and Resource Management Committee and is a member of other caucuses and coalitions. Rep. Turner served on the Interim Select Committee on Ag Policy and was named to the Ag Policy Board by Speaker Pete Laney. Governor Rick Perry appointed him to the Governor's Task Force on Homeland Security.

Rep. Turner is a fourth-generation Texan from Voss, in Coleman County. He and his wife Ann Gale live, farm, and raise sheep on the Turner family farm established in Voss in 1903. Other than farming and ranching, Rep. Turner is executive director of the Coleman Development Company, Inc.

Before his work in rural economic development and service in the Legislature, he owned and operated Bob Turner's Western Wear for 20 years and served with distinction in the U.S. Army Reserve for 35 years.

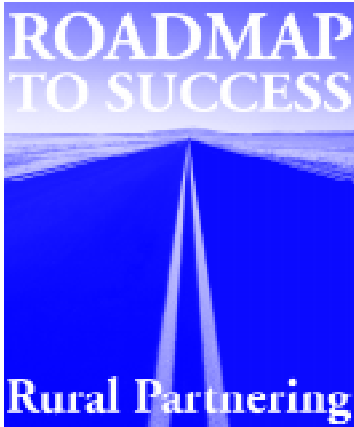

Academic Center, Association Representatives Convene

The Texas Rural Health Association convened a meeting in Austin in May of representatives of academic centers that provide services and programs to rural Texas and health-related associations. This was the second gathering to share what is being done and what works and doesn't work for rural areas. Of those attending, 17 were from 8 academic centers and 18 were from 10 health-related associations. Steve Shelton, executive director of the AHEC at UT Medical Branch (UTMB), was facilitator.

Carol Stehley, North Texas Health Sciences Center, and TRHA board member, reported on the first meeting. The group has identified the need to get health career students in the pipeline early, to reconsider admission criteria, to increase the investment a person has in a rural setting, and to enhance the perception of family practice to encourage more applicants.

Mary Wainwright, TRHA past president, described the new TRHA and TRDC partnership to bring health care and economic interests to the same table.

Dr. Lisa Nash, UTMB, discussed the Medical Branch's development of a Rural Training Track (RTT) for Texas. She reported that physicians often go to where they had residency training; therefore, rural residency slots are a critical step in addressing maldistribution of physicians. Of residents who participated in the RTT, 76 entered rural practice.

Dr. Dennis LaRavia, Texas A&M University, reported on the development of rural tracts and identified the need for financial support. He explored grants available for training programs.

Dr. John Bolding, University of North Texas, discussed "rural life style" weekends to help students

connect with a community and stressed that matching was important for success. "Community trust" was cited by Dr. LaRavia as the key to having a new graduate provider stay in the community. He said that in a study of retention, two-thirds of physicians recruited left within six years, largely due to spouse issues and isolation.

Kathy Becan-McBride, UT Houston School of Public Health, reported on border health initiatives: reaching into local school for student and community education and distance learning

for professionals.

Dr. Bill Thompson, Baylor College of Medicine, provided a handout on CME and outreach programs that serve rural Texas. Education programs include those on a "touch screen" to promote learning for those waiting in clinics and for mobile vans.

Dr. Carlos Valbona reported on Health Sciences for Health Professions started in the Rio Grande Valley.

TRHA plans to reconvene this key group in the future to continue the dialogue.

eLine Partnership Breaking Access Barriers to Nursing Education

Breaking down the geographical barrier to nursing education is one of the main goals of the eLine Partnership, a three-year project in the federal Fund for the Improvement of Post-secondary Education's Learning Anywhere Anytime Partnerships. In collaboration with Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi (TAMU-CC), Del Mar College, and others, eLine Partnership is developing an entry-level nursing curriculum which will be available through the internet, anytime and anywhere. The goal is to educate nurses needed for the evolving health care needs of the population.

The innovative eLine Partnership is working with the existing nursing curricula at TAMU-CC and Del Mar and admission through these colleges will begin in the fall of 2002. The project will be of special interest to students in rural areas who might not otherwise be able to obtain a degree in the traditional class-

room environment. On entering the eLine initiative, each student will be able to designate a choice of degree and institution, and proceed through smaller portions of content at an individual pace.

Other collaborators in the partnership are the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, Public Broadcasting System of South Texas, Coastal Bend Health Education Center, Pecan Valley AHEC, Texas Board of Nurse Examiners, and Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

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Rural Foundation Expands Focus

House Bill 373 of the last session of the Texas Legislature required the Center for Rural Health Initiatives (CRHI) to establish a Rural Health Foundation to raise money to finance health programs in rural areas. Since many national, regional, and in-state foundations award grants to nonprofits, but not to governmental agencies, the CRHI foundation was established.

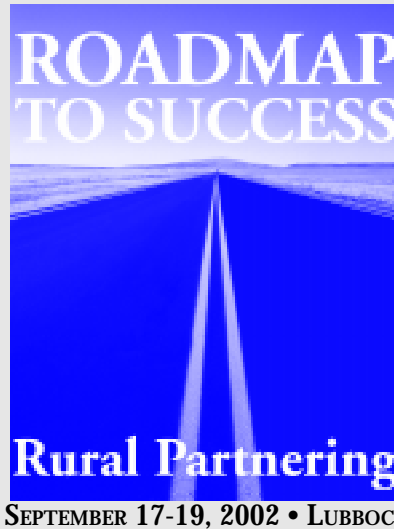
Since the foundation's implementation and the Legislature's placement of CRHI within the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA), there has been discussion about limiting the use of these funds to only health issues. As a result, the word "health" has been eliminated, and the foundation funds will be

available now for any project designed to improve the infrastructure of a rural community.

This concept was discussed by many speakers at the 4th Annual Rural Health Summit in Temple on May 22. A consensus among the attendees indicates that a comprehensive community development effort that incorporates all phases of infrastructure (water quality, transportation, housing, police and fire protection, educational facilities, as well as health issues) will best serve a rural community as it strives to improve quality of life for its citizens. As one participant put it, "I'm as interested that the water be fit to drink as I am that adequate medical care is available."
